THE WORD – NOVEMBER 2022 A Letter from the Senior Warden

As the end of the year draws near, there is one last task the 2022 Vestry needs to tackle. That task is finding new people to lead the church for the coming **2 years**. I have loved serving on vestry as a member as well as BOTH Junior Warden and as Senior Warden. We have faced MANY challenges along the way in the last 3 years, including challenges of COVID 19, no permanent rector, no music director, and no cleaning service. Through prayer, and with the efforts of many of you who have given your time, talents, and treasure, we have successfully tacked many of these issues. Your vestry set 15 goals for the church for the 2022 year. We feel that 5 of our 15 goals were accomplished completely and the other 10 are in some stage of completion or implementation.

Our main challenge is still that of finding a priest. The Search Committee has done a terrific job of preparing materials, setting the stage, and is prepared to interview candidates, but like many churches in our diocese, there have been no candidates presented. We need prayers as we continue the SEARCH process. WE ALSO NEED YOU! 4 vestry positions need to be filled. You will not need to "reinvent" the wheel, but rather keep it spinning on the road of our "VISION" and plan for the future.

If you are asked to serve, you need to prayerfully consider serving your church in a leadership position. If you feel called to serve, **PLEASE** step forward.

When I came back to CEC, I heard many say, "I've already done that", or "I am just too busy, or too old" in reference to serving on the vestry. That is all understandable. However, look around you in church on Sunday morning. Whom do you see that will make a good candidate that has not already been on the vestry? If nobody is able to fulfill the calling, then, who will lead? Many of you worked very hard throughout our preservation project

and continue to maintain patience as we continue to hold services with supply priests. There is "new life" in our church family with a teen group of 12 on Sunday evenings as well as a few new families arriving.

So, the question posed to us by Jesus is: WHOM SHALL I SEND?





LOST BOYS OF SUDAN MINISTRY

- Feel free to ask me for details if you missed previous articles about this ministry. Also, some prior articles are on the back hall bulletin board.

-Please, write checks: "TO: Christ Episcopal; FOR: Lost Boys of Sudan Ministry" and put in the Sunday plate offering. THANK YOU! Any amount is hugely appreciated. Outreach Africa (501-c-3 in Norfolk) disburses funds and is all volunteer, so all funds go to the kids/young adults.

-Appeals and Updates:

A. Please, join the support through June 2023 of the last three of our 'Original 6' Dinka refugee Boys' "family" still displaced in Uganda. CEC has been helping the 6 since 2006.

2023 is Manyang Jambo Puondak's last year of Medical School in Uganda!

Our last payment will be in March, 2023. I am in touch via email with Manyang Jambo. He, Manyang John and Peter Laat are so very appreciative of CEC's help all along the way.

In November, 2022 we will send funds to Outreach Africa (Norfolk) to go towards Manyang's lab's, books, fees, room and board to cover the 1st 4 months of 2023. He will graduate in June! After that the final three "boys" plan to repatriate to their new country of South Sudan where they will be allowed to work - unlike Uganda. The 1st three have made it home to South Sudan. They will assist repatriation of the last three.

- B. Moses' Group of 47 Dinka kids (in Kakuma Refugee Camp) also needs our help with very basic necessities: supplemental food, medical, build a shelter for the new arrivals in the compound, household items. The kids (ages 5 to early 20's) just want stability and are so thankful for any help says Julie Hill of Outreach Africa.
- C. what a joy to have a surprise visit from Akau Jambo Puondak on August 22, 2022! Akau is a talented up and coming comedian in Africa. He finished a 3 month grant at Michigan State in August. He is one of the 'Original 6.' We are in touch by email.

Photos on the next page are of Akau and Julie Hill, the director of Outreach Africa. They had lunch at Warf Hill, shot photos at CEC and then visited me.





Akau has been

awarded another grant to work, live and study at the Steel City Art Foundation (SCAF) in Pittsburgh, PA for 9 months. His J-1 visa has expired and is not renewable for 2 years. To seize the SCAF opportunity means obtaining an O-1 visa which costs \$6000. Akau has set up a crowd fund at a bank in New York, but any funds we raise can go through Outreach Africa. Akau has raised \$1000 so far with his comedy gigs in Africa.

Akau needs help with the initial \$2700 (of the \$6000) to

retain the lawyer to start the O-1 visa process. This is a well-deserved and great opportunity for Akau. SCAF's founder, Steve Hofstetter will be a perfect mentor for Akau, combining Comedy and humanitarianism. Akau performs benefits in several African countries for (and at) African refugee camps. He hopes to have funds to start the Visa process soon. He is very grateful for CEC's help all along the way.

At the age of 12, as one of the older of the 'Original 6', Akau's good humor and positive spirit were instrumental in helping the 6 leave Kakuma Refugee Camp and get safely to Uganda. Akau and 2 others became the Elders at 13. They formed a caring family unit to survive with spirit, spunk, wisdom, and success by themselves in the Sudanese diaspora. Along with Mading and Mabil, Akau are dedicated to make repatriation smoother for their cousins and brothers: Manyang Jambo-, Manyang John-, and Peter Laat- Puondak.
