






Service at St. Luke's Coming Up Sunday, April 30, 2023 10:30 a.m.

Cursillo #170 in Diocese of Southern Virginia will take place at Chanco on the James, April 27th through 30th.

Christ Episcopal Church has supported this program for over 30 years that a large number of current and past parishioners have attended. They are coed and open to all adults and they are able to handle any physical or dietary challenges. A Cursillo Weekend is led by Laity, with clergy assistance. It is a series of prepared talks from the team, mixed with music and discussion, laughter and tears and a lot of food. Each day will start and end with an Episcopal Service.

The concept is to enable each individual person to enhance their faith in God and Christ. You spend a three day residential weekend making a plan on how you will spend the rest of your life", Your 4th Day!" At least five individuals that I am close to elected to go to seminary after their weekend. For most of us it not so dramatic, but most make a significant change to the way they view their everyday life. Angie and I have both led Cursillo Weekends.

If you have any interest talk to me and I will provide as much information as you need to make a decision. You can also go to the website <u>www.cursillodiosova.org</u> for additional information. There will be team and candidates present from all across this diocese. Many times in the past CEC has had up to six candidates attend a single Cursillo weekend.

You don't have to jump into making a decision, you can submit an application up to 24-48 hours prior to the start and subject to availability you're in.

Martin's Corner

For about 20 years Lady J and I have noticed that the ospreys show up on the banks of the River Pagan every year by the first week of March. This year the first sighting was February 26. This time is not by accident as this is when the herring and shad are making their way up the River James and its tributaries to spawn. However, for the first couple of weeks after they return, the male's time is mostly spent squabbling over possession of the prized nesting sites. In between fights for the nests, they are gorging themselves on all the fish that are enjoying a buffet on the roe that is laid in the shallow waters.

A couple of days ago Zoe and I went to our favorite osprey viewing site quite early to ensure the photographic advantage of early morning golden light. When we arrived, the only bird around was the usual statuesque blue heron that keeps a watchful eye over that stretch of the Pagan as shown in the first image. Shortly thereafter, a cormorant, with its emeraldgreen eye, came sauntering by looking for his first meal of the day as shown in the second image. After a short dive, the cormorant came up with a fish in its beak and quickly scurried away to protect its precious possession from predators as shown in the third image.

The first osprey finally showed up as the mist was lifting, high above the river on a weathervane from where it could survey a wide area in search of an unsuspecting fish swimming near the river surface as shown in the fourth image. It did not have to wait long and soon landed on a piling with its catch as shown in the fifth image. However, as with the cormorant, the osprey must protect its highly sought-after catch. It can be seen trying to hide its possession with its wings from birds flying overhead in image 6. After being continually harassed, the osprey decides to take off for a more secure dining spot as shown in the last image.








PAINTING AT ST. LUKE'S


